One in 10 Australians living with epilepsy experience a seizure-related injury each year, many of which are potentially life-threatening, according to an article just published in *MJA InSight* to mark Purple Day® (an international epilepsy awareness day).<sup>1</sup>

The most commonly reported seizure-related injuries sustained by those living with the neurological (brain) disease include head, water immersion, driving, burns, fractures and dental-related injuries.<sup>1,2</sup>
